

38 Years of Service with Regina Roy

Regina Roy has achieved 38 years of service at Americhem working her way up from Lab Secretary to IT Help Desk Support to her current role as Application & Service Lead in IT. Regina was hired on November 7, 1983 through a temp agency and was quickly offered a full time position. She took interest in the IT department during her time in administrative roles. Regina has always loved helping people through her various IT roles and now enjoys overseeing many IT projects and playing a key role in Americhem's IT infrastructure.

To celebrate Americhem's 80 year anniversary, Regina was kind enough to be interviewed as one of Americhem's longest tenured employees. The dialogue was as follows:

What was the field of plastics like when you first started? It was a very dirty environment back then; nothing like it is today. I knew that if I had to go into the plant for any reason, I would come out with pigment colors all over me. Being in the secretary role at the time, I knew not to wear my favorite pair of shoes to work on any of the days that I would be in the plant.

What were some of the biggest challenges back then?

From an IT perspective, one of the main challenges back then was opening our plant on Steels Corners Road in Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio. They had opened a position for IT Help Desk Support, which I applied for and was accepted. There were a lot of kinks to work through since it was a new plant with new systems. It was hard work, but very rewarding and I had fun being a part of the plant startup.

What changes have you seen in plastics?

Well, of course, the way that plastics companies operate now is very different. We used to write letters on typewriters back then and look where we are today with computers and even manufacturing equipment.

Being with a company for decades, you see people come and go, but I have built many amazing friends that even though they may not work at Americhem anymore, we still all get together quite often. What are the key issues that you see Americhem addressing in the future?

We will definitely be focusing on IT security because it is an ever-changing arena that we have to keep up with. Every day, electronic communications grow bigger and bigger and become more to handle. Between internal and external communications, there is a lot to manage and we do a fantastic job of staying ahead of the curve, but we will need to continue those aggressive efforts as Americhem continues to expand.

Please share one memory of a funny situation that you encountered at Americhem.

I've always been a very shy and quiet individual; I was actually terrified to go to work and talk to people when I first started at such a young age. Back then, the lab was a big open area and one of the guys I worked with was standing by the back of the lab where our main phone was located. It started ringing while I was in the middle of doing something and of course to tease me, he yelled over to me to answer the phone because he knew how shy I was. As the phone kept ringing, I finally said back, "Answer it yourself." Everybody started cracking up laughing because it was so unlike me and this guy was always a character. I think the fact that I even spoke up surprised everyone into tears of laughter.
